That Group, as others in the District, was the recipient of a financial grant which enabled them to upgrade facilities at their hall.

With so many activities happening, I can only highlight a few.

While, unfortunately, Easter Scout Camp had to be cancelled because flooding had affected the camping ground at Crosslands, a number of Groups organised last minute alternatives, at which the Scouts had lots of fun.

Dragon Skin recommenced after a 2-year break and was well attended by Benowie Venturer Scouts.

Just a week later, there were strong turnouts at the Anzac March and Dawn Service held by Hornsby RSL.

In May, Scouts attended Scouthike, supported by Rover Scouts, Leaders and Venturer Scouts, followed by State Scout Rally in August.

Many Youth Members visited (or participated in) Gang Show and, a number of the Groups held Family or Group camps throughout the year.





The highlight for many Joey Scouts was the Hoporee at Camp Kariong in March, where apart from a number of fantastic activities (ranging from Archery to an Escape Room; discovering the various insects around the campsite and being Spies), for the first time they slept in tents by themselves, with no parents. Particular thanks to 1st Hornsby Heights which strongly supported this activity, along with leaders and parents, Rovers, Venturers and Scouts from the District. This

was an extremely successful event, in no small part due to the huge effort put in by Lindy Muir who took on the role of District Joey Scout Leader (in addition to her duties at 1st Hornsby Heights).

Also in March, West Pennant Hills Cubs held a Bikethon at their local oval and raised \$1,500 for the Children's Hospital.

Otherwise, there were many Peak Awards presented to Joey Scouts, Cub Scouts, Scouts and Venturer Scouts.

All Groups were extremely happy to see that Scouting life post covid was finally starting to get back to normal! Although we are now 'living with covid' and restrictions have considerably eased, the effects of the last two years are being felt in several ways. One key area, which was evident at some of the events, is that skills that are normally passed on from the older youth to the younger ones has not occurred. The younger ones have missed out on this natural transfer of knowledge. So gaps in learning have been identified and are being addressed through skill learning and activities.

As a result of the pandemic, some youth lost interest in Scouting and they found other activities to do and now it is harder to entice them back. This has impacted numbers - in some areas numbers have been maintained but in other areas numbers have been reduced. This applies to youth members, leaders and adult helpers. This meant that the Programs needed to be reinvigorated. There is still a need to actively search out new youth and adult members.

Another area has been the reduced take-up of volunteering. Groups are trying to actively engage parents through family camps, family fun days and other activities.

All Groups are still mindful of their covid Safe Plans and make adjustments as required in line with NSW state government and Scouts NSW.

On behalf of the District, I would like to thank the youth members for their enthusiasm in participating in the various activities now on offer. And to the Leaders for their unwavering support and dedication to the youth.

The Support Committees continued their excellent work managing their respective Group financials, financial obligations, marketing, grant applications and fundraising to allow the district to continue delivering for the youth members.

Almost all of our region activities have been full over the last 12 months and the teams have been busy not only running events but working to get people qualifications. I acknowledge the large amount of time and work all of these people have freely given working to ensure that we continue to provide safe activities to all our members. Over the last 12 months many of our regions youth and leaders attended the National Alpine School, State Alpine School and State Summer School. At these events a large number of people attained Guide qualifications, Safe & Trained Participant qualifications, OAS stage progressions and Cert II or III in outdoor recreation. These events mean our region continues to offer a wide range of outdoor adventures for our youth.

In a summary our Region Activities team has run courses, skill days and skill weekends in the following activities, Abseiling, Rock Climbing, Canyoning, Bushwalking, First-Aid, Snow Sports, Water Sports and Environment. Our Adventurous Activity Guides have continued to develop their skills during the last year by attending Region workshops, skills days and advance rescue workshops.

I encourage all members who are getting outdoors and taking part in their chosen activity fields to continue to develop their skills and then have those skills recognised with formal qualifications (TAFE Certificate II, III or IV in Outdoor Recreation).

Bushwalking:

Bushwalking is a core area in "The Program" for our youth and will continue to be a basic skill requirement for all youth and their leader.

We have a broad range of skilled people to assist with all those more difficult and remote walks. Look out for skills development workshops on the State Activities website. For more information please contact the Region Commissioner Activities.

Abseiling:

Abseiling Skill days for Venturers, Rovers and Leaders, were run within the Region. The



venue is either Wahroonga Rocks or Lindfield Rocks. These days are aligned with the SIS Training package and Harry Day, the Abseiling Co-ordinator would love to talk to you about your abseiling wish list.

The Region runs Scouts only abseiling days approximately 8 times a year at Lindfield Rocks. Scott Osborne the Coordinator continues to do a fantastic job of encouraging out youth participation. He runs one, two or three, 2-hour sessions depending on bookings, during the day and each youth member will do a minimum of five abseils in complete safety. Aside from this groups around our region continue to offer some really fun adventures and abseils challenging our youth.

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Caving:

Our caving team led by Ben Power. Caving has been up and running as usual with a number of region trips to Bungonia Caves, Wee Jasper Caves and a few other places. It's always a fun adventure getting down and dirty exploring underground.

Canyoning:

Canyon is one of regions most popular activity. Vision impairment does not stop you canyoning just ask Seth about his canyon adventure which included a 60m waterfall abseil. The water dragon below was also looking for a bit of fun as well.

There is always plenty happening with our Rovers hitting some of the more difficult canyons in NSW

and Victoria. The year has seen a variety of canyoning undertaken from basic to advanced levels. We ran 3 basic canyon adventure weekends, and 2 rigging and rescue weekends during the year. We continue to expand our horizons along with the number of Guides we have to assist in this space.

A big thank your to Craig Stanfield and Shane Miller the Canyoning Coordinators who lead an enthusiastic band of dedicated and highly skilled canyoners.







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Rock Climbing:

Adrian Kladnig as the Climbing Co-ordinator has again run basic and advanced rock-climbing skill weekends and skill days in the Blue Mountains and other environs. Adrian has been assisted by Tom during the year who has completed his Guide Rock Climbing training. This year Scout climbers visited cliffs in the Southern Highlands, the Watagans, Nowra, Arapiles and the Grampians in Western Victoria.

Indoor climbing is still very popular.

Cubs and Scouts can take part and build up their skill levels as a prelude to Venturers by going indoor rock climbing. Remember that Scouts do not have to be qualified to use climbing gyms.

Flying Fox:

The Flying Fox Team has been on hold during the year but are looking forward to 2023/2024. A big thank you to David Lister who as the Flying Fox Co-ordinator who has working to get the Flying Fox back up and running across the state. Contact David via the SNR website if you have a desire to zoom down a wire cable at warp speed or if you would like to learn how to set up a Flying Fox.

First-Aid:

The Regions First Aid Team again provided through St John Ambulance many opportunities for our youth and leaders to gain first aid training and qualifications. John Crowley and his team have done a magnificent job promoting First Aid to the Region. All our First Aid Instructors are fully trained with St John Ambulance and I would encourage every member of the Scout Movement, young or old, to keep their First-Aid skills up to date. Whilst there are other first aid providers please give first preference to our first aid team who provide first aid support to many of the large events run within our Region and further afield.

Cross Country Skiing:

There were plenty of opportunities to cross country ski in 2022. The region held a basic XCD weekend in July but had to cancel the XCD camping weekend at short notice.

However there was the National Cross Country Ski School and the State Cross Country Ski schools that ran during the 2022 season. These schools mean we have a large number of XCD Guides in our region and a number of assistant guides as well. These schools were spent not only doing ski skills but learning how



to stay safe and take shelter when things go wrong. This was a picture of our team digging a snow cave.



2023 will again see us hitting the cross country ski-ing trails running basic cross country ski skills weekend and overnight camping and survival skills in the snow weekend. See the SNR website for more information

Water Sports (Canoeing, Sailing, Swimming & Snorkelling):

There have been many water activities happening across our Region with Canoeing, Sailing, Swimming, Surfing, Snorkelling and even some diving. The issuing of water skill certificates continues to rise and there have been many opportunities to get certificates during the years. A group of youth and leaders achieve water skills qualifications (canoeing/ kayak flat water, canoe/kayak white water, river crossings, basic water rescues) at the NSW Summer Alpine School in January 2023. Cubs, Scouts, Venturers, Rovers and Leaders have all enjoyed the activities on offer.

If you have a training need then please contact the Region Commissioner Activities to discuss further.

Water Sports (White Water Kayaking):

David Fisher and his Team have run White Water Kayaking courses training Venturers, Rovers and Leaders how to safely negotiate everything up to Grade 2 white water. The course uses Penrith lakes white water course as an introduction weekend followed up by a weekend of real river White Water Paddling. All training is SIS aligned and equipment is provided, so we encourage you to let your youth know about this wonderful new offering. There was also the NSW Summer Alpine School that offer youth and leaders the opportunity for OAS stage progressions and qualifications.





Cycling:

Many groups have been cycling for years but cycling has been brought into the adventurous activities qualification framework. We are getting large numbers of people looking to get qualifications and this is great. If you have not started work on this then please contact the Region Commissioner Activities.

The NSW Summer School in Jindabyne in January 2023 was a perfect opportunity for leaders to get qualifications and youth to get OAS stage progressions. We had a number of youth and leaders attend from Sydney North. One youth member from out region even received the tree hugger award for his efforts. Well done Matt.

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Environment:

The Environment Team led by Kathy ran a number of events during 2022 providing opportunities for our youth to learn about the environment. We will continue to have our youth visited places of interest both within and outside our Region and help our youth members to learn more about how to navigate through the bush in an environmentally friendly way, maximising their bush experiences.

Jota/Joti:

The Radio Team encouraged our Regions Scouts and Guides to join together for a weekend of radio and internet fun, where they contacted other youth members from all over Australia and around the world. The Team will also run special nights at your Troop location, electronics, radio and computer skills amongst other topics can be organised for you, contact Glen Satchell.

A big thanks also to all the Activity Team Co-ordinators for their dedication and hard work throughout the year. Every member of our Activity Team loves passing on their knowledge and skills to all that take part in our activities. Congratulations to all the Team.

Firstly, my grateful acknowledgement to the Leader Trainers and Assistant Leader Trainers from the State training team and Sydney North Region for their time and commitment to the cause of training in Scouting. Without their selfless time and knowledge, our training could not happen.

I would also like to thank Belinda Hose and Donna Staff at Region head office for their ongoing assistance to enable me to function!

As we emerge from the disruption of Covid over the past 12-18 months, we are gradually re -engaging the youth and leaders back into the wonderful world of scouting.

Finding new leaders is an ongoing challenge and the demands of parents nowadays seem higher.

With growing awareness of mental health in society and high leader interest, we scheduled several youth Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) 2-day courses over the period October 2022 -March 2023. The course equips adults who teach, care for and support young people, with the skills and confidence needed to recognise and respond to a young person experiencing a mental health problem or crisis.

We had around 85+ leaders and Rovers complete the course and feedback on usefulness of the course has been most positive. I would like to thank John Crowley (RL Activities) and Steve Tufts (DC Lower North Shore) for their organization of some of these courses, and the Scouts NSW MHFA Training team for their magnificent support as instructors too.

It is acknowledged that leaders are continually under time constraints and their capacity to allocate time to their training requirements can be squeezed. The on-demand (Scout Central) and face-to-face (residential) training programme is in place to enable adults to become competent and confident supporters of youth and leaders themselves. A desire for learning, self-improvement and networking would be other motivations.

The aspiration is for trainee leaders to attain their Certificate of Proficiency after 12 months from becoming a member, and their Wood Badge leadership credentials within the next 12 months – a two-year timeline, which has recently been extended from the former 18 months' timeline.

However, the mandatory on-demand training for WHS and Child Safe Scouting are nonnegotiable, and must be completed every 3 years. In the main, most leaders and adult supporters have been compliant; those members who (after several follow-up contacts) have chosen not to complete this mandatory training, have been resigned as members. It is well recognized the residential training components are an important content delivery mechanism not just to enhance the on-demand training content, but for leader networking and learning in a group dynamic.

While there is a desire for more flexible training face-to-face course delivery/scheduling, such as local part time courses, the ongoing challenge is sufficient attendees to warrant the time of volunteer leader trainers. How we facilitate face-to-face training is a work in progress.

The new residential training calendar format for 2023 is aimed at providing sufficient courses and sites within logistical constraints to enable leaders to more easily attend face-to face training. For Sydney North leaders, there are courses now run alternately at Pennant Hills, Bundilla and Glenrock. To date, there seems to be improved & strong attendances.

There have been 17 Wood Badge Awardees over the period April 2022-March 2023. Congratulations to you all. BRAVO!

The Future

One goal for 2023/2024 is to identify and appoint District and Region Leader Trainers to assist and shepherd leaders through their training programme.

We aim to schedule further youth Mental Health First Aid 2-day courses for adult leaders, Rovers and hopefully Venturers, and some re-accreditation courses over the next 12 months.

A need for training to assist leaders in catering for youth members with disabilities (special needs) has been raised and this will be explored further.

Improved communication concerning training awareness and course availability through such mediums as a dedicated SNR website page and the Compass newsletter.

It is pleasing to see increasing examples of inclusion in Scouting, both at group level and at events. Whilst we have continued to embrace cultural diversity in membership and programming, it has been more challenging for our organisation to include youth with disabilities and additional support needs in mainstream scouting rather than in special needs groups. Youth with allergies, anxiety, autism, gender diversity, intellectual disability, physical disability, unusual behaviours and other diverse needs are actively participating in scouting across our region with support and encouragement from Leaders and other youth members.

However, not all Groups are currently able to welcome youth members with additional support needs owing to shortage of Leaders, insufficient training and other resources. Sensory Kits are available for Groups who need full kits or replacement items. Contact Region Office to collect, or Beth Mitchell for more information.

Diverse needs can also be managed at Activity Days and larger events with forward planning and effective communication between event organisers and home leaders. SNR Scouthike is a physically and emotionally challenging event with difficult terrain and potential extremes of weather, where resilience and scouting skills are tested. This year a Scout participated in Scouthike in their wheelchair and used an All-Terrain wheelchair where required.

Region and district camps, Cuborees and Jamborettes, provide important experience and nights-under-canvas for youth members. Designated sensory spaces operating at these events offer crucial support for participants experiencing sensory overload, exhaustion or needing short breaks from challenging activities.

Hunter and Coastal Region Myths and Legends Corroboree was held at Dungog on Wonnarua Country over 5 days in January 2023. For many Scouts this was their first "big" camping event owing to cancellation of both the NSW 2020 Cuboree and the 2022 Australian Jamboree. A Scout from Unit 22 gave a Welcome to Country and his Unit's Gateway featured the Baiame Dreaming story.

The Sensory Chill-out Zone at Corroboree was staffed by four Leaders over two days. Conveniently located between First Aid, SES Activity Base and Sub Camp 1 Headquarters, it was busy throughout providing support to youth members and relief to Leaders.

Sydney North All Abilities Scout Group continues to provide scouting to members with ongoing support needs. Currently they meet weekly, alternating between in-hall, out of hall and on-line meetings.

Plans are underway for Agoonoree to return next year after disappointing cancellations owing to Covid lockdowns and limited availability of venues and Leaders. Agoonoree is an inclusive camp for both Scouts and Girl Guides which runs over 4 days and 3 nights with catering provided. Attendees can choose between tent camping or bunkroom accommodation. The program includes on-site activities, a full day off site, movies, games, a disco and a campfire. A sensory Chill Space is provided for youth attendees as well as a Leader Chill Zone.

RC Diversity and Inclusion, May 2023



Period: July 2022 – June 2023

Introduction

Tasman McManis has continued in his role as RC Issues Management with on-going assistance from Viv Waddingham Professor of Clinical Psychology and Berowra Venturer Leader and Grace Johnson Rover and Venturer Leader in Training.

I would like to thank the team members for their assistance and support during the past twelve months and thank Quentin Amos for his on-going support and guidance as we seek to resolve these people issues.

It is also important to thank Bill Barnes from State Office who has been very supportive in helping to try and resolve some of the thornier issues that have occurred in the last twelve months.

Issues Covered in the Period

During the reporting period the Issues Management team has continued to handle a broad range of issues.

These issues have mainly involved adult leaders and parents and included:

- Abusive language between adult members of Scouting
- Parents not cooperating or being aggressive with leaders.
- Issues with leaders and parents where a child attending Scouts is on the spectrum or has a disability.
- Leader disagreements and shaming of leaders
- Leader personality clashes
- Conflict resolution
- Inappropriate touching of another adult
- Group mediation
- Inappropriate behaviour amongst Rovers

Approach to Issues Management

The approach adopted by the Sydney North Region and the Issues Management Team is to encourage issues to be resolved at the section or group level as much as possible. Where this is not possible it is raised with the relevant District Commissioner. If the issue is proving more difficult to resolve, then it can be raised with the Region Issues Management team.

In some cases, the issue is raised directly with the State Office and on these occasions (depending on the nature of the issue), the State Office will encourage the Region to get involved and look to resolve the issue.

Conclusion & Recommendations

On several occasions adults have become entrenched about their views/actions, refused to apologise about their behaviour and threatened legal action which has resulted (where they are in uniform) in them being dismissed from the movement.

Over the next 12 months it is planned to produce information for leaders through Compass and via District Commissioners to provide some background about issues management to try and educate leaders and parents about the behavioural standards that are expressed through the Law & Promise.

It is recommended that Groups regularly remind leaders, youth members and parents of the Scout Law and Promise at weekly meetings and prior to overnight activities to reinforce the movement's expected behaviour standards.

During the last year there has been an increase in issues linked to youth members with disabilities. Often leaders may not have had any experience with youth members with these conditions and it is recommended that the Region look to introduce a pilot training program to help leaders better understand how to work with these youth members. The program could be supported by relevant reference materials to help leaders when required.

The financial year 2022/23 was the first full year of operation post COVID and resulted in an overall operating cost of \$73,871 for the year against an operating budget cost of \$87,659.

The Region's properties resulted in an operating surplus of \$11,327 which was \$26K under budget mainly due to unexpected repairs and maintenance on the various Region controlled properties. In particular the cost of cleaning out of the Belrose Hall in readiness for hand back to Crown Lands in March 2023 was a drain on funds.

Operation of the Region's three camp sites resulted in a cost of \$3,793 to the Region which was better than budget largely due to better than anticipated revenue from Camp Windeyer. Ingleside Camp continues to be a drain on resources as we work towards bringing the camp up to an acceptable standard.

The core business of the Region is to provide Scouting activities and support for Groups which resulted in an operating surplus to \$35,176 which was \$25K over budget and can largely be attributed to the Scouthike 2022 surplus of \$16K. All Scouting Activities, whether at Region or District level are required to achieve a minimum surplus of 10% which I am pleased to report was achieved with all activities conducted.

I would like to thank Donna Staff and Belinda Hose for their valuable help and support over the last twelve months. Thanks, must also go to James Goodman, Neelam Jain and Saeed Saund at the State Service Centre for their help and support.
